Main Assignments

Terms-Students will write the about the major events, people, and movements of each chapter of study. These are completed in paragraph form and cover the important who, when, where, what, and why it was or still is important.

Short Answer Questions- Short-answer exam questions require you to remember and reproduce historical knowledge in a one page response.

Papers (FRQ)-All the major papers are listed throughout the course syllabus.

Prompts after every chapter, students construct a thesis to a Historical prompt dealing with the recent topics of study. In class discussions follow.

Document Based Questions (DBQ)- Students will complete a take-home DBQ at least four times throughout the year. There will more out of class if deemed necessary. Several DBQ's are also done throughout the year as in-class assignments.

Primary Source Readings-Students will analyze primary sources throughout the year during in—class discussions.
